One day, April gets an email to her "Nosy Nellie" email from Charlie, a single man who recently had his heart broken. He was dating a woman who had a kid, but when they broke up, he realized how much he missed the little guy and being a father figure. His initial question is about whether Nellie recommends that he try to stay in touch with the little boy.

When April publishes her response to Charlie's email, he appreciates her advice so much that he starts sending her more emails. She responds privately, and they strike up a correspondence. April realizes that she's falling for him, and Lisa advises him to go for it, but she doesn't want to assume that Charlie shares her feelings and worries about being unprofessional.

One day, a very handsome man visits the newspaper offices asking for "Nellie." Not knowing that it's Charlie, and feeling shy, April points him to her editor in chief, a very attractive and no-nonsense professional journalist named Elizabeth. Charlie immediately asks Elizabeth on a date, and she accepts. April is devastated.
